Id al-Fitr holiday, the PLO official said.

Attorney Jawad Boulous, one of the men detained by the police, added that the reception was a traditional affair that Nusseibeh's predecessor, Faisal Husseini, had hosted for years.

On Sunday night, however, Public Security Minister Uzi Landau issued an order forbidding the reception, on the grounds that it was being sponsored by the PLO. The order was approved by the cabinet in a telephone poll and delivered to the hotel two hours before the reception was due to take place.

As the guests began arriving, police detained six Palestinians for questioning, accusing them of defying the order and trying to hold the event outside the hotel instead. Nusseibeh protested that he had merely been trying to apologize

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to the guests, who were unaware of the cancelation, and to explain to them what had happened. He told reporters that his detention had been "an oversensitive reaction on the part of the people who carried it out.'

"It's too bad that instead of sending representatives with holiday greetings, the government chose to use an iron fist," Nusseibeh added: Boulous noted that the police's while heavy-handed way of enforcing the order had been even worse than the directive itself.

But Landau defended his decision, saying that the reception had been organized by the PA and, as such, was forbidden by law.

According to the Oslo Accords, the PA is not permitted to conduct political activity in East Jerusalem. This prohibition was later anchored in Israeli law, but remained almost

completely unenforced until a few months ago. Boulous admitted that the event had been organized by the PLO, but denied that the PA had been involved.

Prime Minister Ariel Sharon defended Landau's decision at a Likud faction meeting yesterday. "This government has made a clear decision not to let the PA operate any longer in Jerusalem, the capital of Israel, as if it were under its control," he said.

But left-wing politicians sharply criticized the decision. Opposition leader MK Yossi Sarid (Meretz), who met Nusseibeh after he was released, called the incident "the height of stupidity;" while Foreign Minister Shimon Peres told reporters at the Knesset that "it was a mistake to have acted as [the police] did." Nusseibeh, Peres said, should be treated

## Nusseibeh held for 'political activity' in J'lem



The police yesterday briefly detained the top Palestine Liberation Organization official in East Jerusalem, Sari Nusseibeh, so as to stop him from holding a hotel reception for diplomats.

Police also detained and questioned five other Palestinians, including Palestinian Authority legislator Hatam Abed al-Khader, on suspicion of violating the law that bans the PA from conducting political ac-tivity in Jerusalem. A police spokesman said the men had been held for about an hour.

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
